

Course Syllabus*Academic Year 2017/18***Course Title:** History of Parliaments and Representative Democracy

The course aims at explaining how representative democracy and institutions have evolved in the last 150 years, and at analyzing how they are being affected by the challenges of the twenty-first century. The course will be opened and closed by seminars jointly led by the two instructors. Three classes, led by Giovanni Orsina, will consider the historical evolution of European representative institutions from the late nineteenth century to the 1980s; three classes, led by Leonardo Morlino, will focus on the transformations of the last decade.

Assessment

Students will be requested to write two short papers, one with a historical approach and another one with a polsci one (between 4,000 and 4,500 word each), on a topics to be chosen in agreement with the instructors. Participation to class discussion will be considered in the final grade (20%).
