Course Title: The Europeanization of National Parliaments and the Euro-national parliamentary system

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Course description

The course will be devoted to the role of National parliaments in the European Union (hereinafter, EU). It will be divided in two parts.

In the first part, the Europeanization of National Parliaments will be analyzed: that is, how the European integration process has transformed and impacted on the traditional features (structural and functional) of Member States' Parliaments. The idea that National Parliaments were the "losers" or "latecomers" of this process and the different paths these longstanding institutions followed to adapt to the EU will be examined in depth. A section of the course will be focused on the provisions that the Treaty of Lisbon has devoted to the National Parliaments, now called upon to exercise a bunch of "European Powers", among which the scrutiny on the compliance with the principle of subsidiarity, through the Early Warning System. The role of National Parliaments will be analyzed against the backdrop of the current trends in the EU form of government (in particular, the growing importance of intergovernmentalism in the EU decision-making).

In the second part, a key analytic tool will be proposed to the students: the euro-national parliamentary system. After a comparison with other models proposed to frame the role of National Parliaments in the EU (the traditional model; the virtual third Chamber; the multilevel parliamentary field), the main features of the euro-national parliamentary system will be enucleated and examined. In this framework, the four different types of relationships shaping the system will be analysed: between the EP and the other EU institutions; between the EP and NPs; between NPs and other EU institutions; between each NP and its respective government.

At least two guest seminars involving visiting professors – especially practitioners working in National Parliaments of the European Union – are to be organized in the framework of this course.

Assessment

Students will be asked to write one paper (between 4,000 and 5,000 words), preferably regarding one concrete example of Europeanization process or of a procedure within the euro-national parliamentary system.
